North America

| Range | Details |
|-----------------------|--|
| Rocky Mountains | runs from northwestern Canada through Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, and New Mexico |
| Appalachian Mountains | runs along the US east coast, from Maine to Georgia; includes several important subranges, like the Green Mountains, the Catskills, the Blue Ridge Mountain, and the Great Smoky Mountains, but not New York's Adirondacks |
| Cascade Mountains | major range of the Pacific Northwest; includes Mount Rainier and Mount St. Helens in Washington and Mount Hood in Oregon |
| Sierra Nevada | range in Central California; home to Yosemite National Park and Sequoia National Park |

Europe

| Range | Details |
|--------------------|---|
| Alps | crescent that runs through southeast France, Switzerland, northern Italy, Liechtenstein, Austria, Germany, and Slovenia |
| Caucasus Mountains | runs from the Black Sea to the Caspian Sea through Russia, Georgia, and Azerbaijan |
| Ural Mountains | runs north to south in western Russia, forming the boundary between Europe and Asia |

Other Continents

| Range | Details |
|-----------------|---|
| Andes Mountains | South America; runs along the entire western coast of South America, from Venezuela in the north, through Ecuador, Peru, and Bolivia, to Chile & Argentina's southern tip |
| Atlas Mountains | Africa; on the coast of northwest Africa, from Morocco, through Algeria, to Tunisia; immediately north of the Sahara Desert |
| Himalayas | Asia; highest mountain range in the world; runs through Bhutan, India, Nepal, China, and Pakistan; found east of the Karakoram Mountains and south of the Tibetan Plateau |
